
Am I suitable for History?

To be successful at History you need to be the sort of person who does not just accept things at face value but questions what you see and hear and asks people why they hold the views they do.






Edexcel GCSE History

You will study **four** elements split over **three** exams:

Paper	Topic	Length	GCSE weighting
Paper 1: Thematic study and historic environment	Medicine in Britain, c1250– present and the British Sector of the Western Front, 1914- 18: injuries, treatments and the trenches	1 hour and 30 minutes	30%
Paper 2: Period study and British depth study	Early Elizabethan England, 1558–88. Superpower relations and the Cold War, 1941–91	1 hour and 45 minutes	40%
Paper 3: Modern depth study	Weimar and Nazi Germany, 1918–39	1 hour and 20 minutes	30%



What are the benefits of studying History?

Transferrable skills

 Communication, analysis, research, problem solving, extended writing, planning, arguing/debating, weighing-up evidence, reaching judgements, putting across points of view etc...

Links with other subjects

Skills cross over well to other subjects like English, RE and Geography

Reputation

 A rigorous academic subject looked upon highly by colleges, universities, employers and apprenticeships who want people who can think for themselves, problem solve, are disciplined, open minded etc.

Relevance

 It's not just in the past! Helps students understand the present and make sense of the world they are growing up in
