Dear Year 11 students, parents and legal guardians

I am writing to inform you of the arrangements for exam results day, **Thursday** 24th August 2023.

You are welcome to come into school **between 8am-11:30am** and should **enter** school through the pupil entrance and go directly to the Main hall.

Staying on at Sixth Form:

* Courses will be agreed between you and Sixth Form staff - please do not worry if you want to change course, as this is still possible.

- * Careers advice will be available
- * You will then exit through the doors at the bottom of the maths corridor.

What are the changes to the grade boundaries?

As in any year, grade boundaries for every specification will be set by the senior examiners after they have reviewed the work produced by students in the assessments. But those senior examiners will be guided in their decisions about where to set grade boundaries by information about the grades achieved in prepandemic years by cohorts of students, along with prior attainment data. That means the 2023 cohort will be protected in grading terms if their exam performance is a little lower than before the pandemic.

What if I am not happy with my results; can I appeal?

No. Any appeal is initially made by the school in advance of results being issued to you. If you wish to request a copy of your script or wish to request a clerical recheck or review of marking, school will advise you how to do this and the forms you need to complete. https://www.jcq.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/2023/07/JCQ-Post-Results-Services.pdf

Can re-sit my exams and how do I go about this?

The Autumn series of exams offer the option to re-sit GCSE Maths and GCSE English Language only. These exams will take place from 7th to 13th November 2023.

When do I get my actual exam certificates?

Certificates are sent to schools about three months after results day. You can come into school in the first week of December to collect and sign for them or we can post them to you if you confirm your details.

I didn't apply to the Sixth Form, but my apprenticeship/job isn't available anymore or I have decided I don't want to move schools/college now; can I still apply to the Sixth Form?

We make a commitment to all of our Year 11s and we will make sure you are on the best course that is suited for you; this may be our Foundation Year or you could be able to move straight onto Level 3 courses.

What if I get home and need to speak to someone?

We will issue telephone numbers and email addresses on results day and we will have people available to help you throughout that day and the following week.

I cannot pick my results up; what should I do?

Please email Mrs Lightfoot and we will email your results to you on the day. Please be aware that it it may be after 11am. examoffice@hilbre.wirral.sch.uk

Post-Results Services, Summer 2023

Deciding what to do after you've got your A/AS Level or GCSE results

Exam board reviews of results

Review of marking: exam boards review their marking to ensure your work was marked accurately in line with the mark scheme

Review of moderation: exam boards review the moderation of the coursework from your school or college to ensure it was done fairly, reliably and consistently

Clerical re-check: exam boards re-check that all marks have been included and added up correctly

2. Appeal

Your school or college can only request an appeal after the exam board has reviewed your result.

A preliminary appeal can take up to 42 calendar days. If your school or college believes the preliminary appeal has not addressed the issue, it can decide to submit an application for an appeal hearing and that can take up to 70 calendar days.


Please note, appeals are not the irst step in checking your grade.

3. Exam Procedures Review Service (EPRS)

Your school or college can only ask the relevant regulator to review what the exam board has done after the exam board has completed the appeal hearing.

The EPRS will look at whether the exam board has followed the regulator's rules and its own procedures. It will not review your work and cannot change your grade. The relevant regulator can ask the exam board to look at your appeal again if they think the exam board made a mistake.

Not all qualifications are covered by the EPRS so please check the relevant regulator's website (Ofqual, CCEA Regulation or Qualifications Wales) for more information.



¹ If you are a private candidate, you can apply directly to your exam board for a review of your result and an appeal. If not, you must talk to your school or college and they will contact the exam board as needed.
